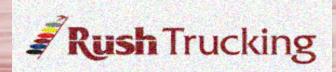
One Strategy NAFTA

 - Continued Growth
 - Consolidation
 - Expected to increase in next three years
 - Mexico is expected to be US largest trading partner by the end of 2018
 - Automotive is the Largest Industry and Fastest growing in the Mexico
 - Southern US is fastest Growing in Supply Base

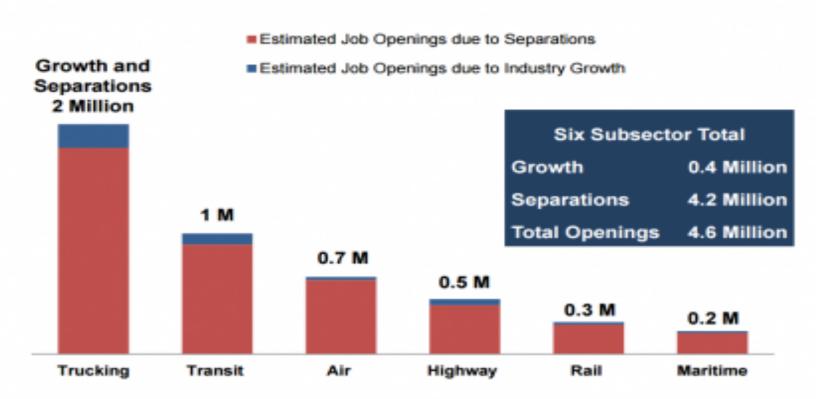


Canada Trade \$660 Billion Mexico Trade \$592 Billion 2014 Total Import and Export

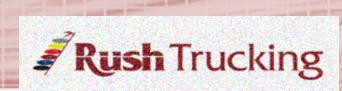


Estimated Number of Total Job Openings due to Growth and Separations 2012–2022 (Ranked)

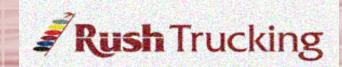
North American Sourcing



Sourcing

- North America Sourcing
 - Product is usually in Plant with 7-10 days versus 20 to 30 days from China
 - New Visibility Tools for OTR
 - System integration
 - New Rail Link over US-Mexico Border
 - Connecting Brownsville to Matamoros
 - First in over a Century
 - Canadian Border Customs Process
 - Delays almost non existent
 - Bonded Rail Service to and from Mexico
 - Canadian Exchange helping Canadian Suppliers
 - Electronic systems for Clearance

Key Issues



- Mexico Supply Chain Issues
 - 85% of Goods traded with the US in 2017 moved Rail or Truck
 - Visibility in the Movement (Current Study)
 - Truck movement has many hand offs
 - Average Static Time at US Mexico Border is 21-28 hours
 - » 16,000 average truck crossings per day 2013
 - » Cost of over \$1.5 Billion in additional Inventory sitting at the Borders daily
 - Border Crossings 2014
 - » Canada 11,551,000
 - 16% decrease since 2000
 - » Mexico 9,678,000
 - 29% increase since 2000

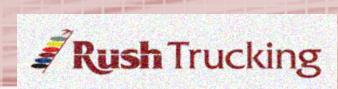
Additional Hurdles



Other Hurdles

- Imbalance Mexico
 - 40% Imbalance North vs South
 - Causing Rates to Rise
 - Infrastructure
 - Growth is out pacing the infrastructure plans
 - Hand off issues will still be here for another 18-24 months
 - Disparate Rules
 - » Truck Weight Limits
 - » Mexican Border Freight Inspections
- Capacity
 - North American Shortage is here

 - US/Mexico Chamber (Supply Chain Blue Print Committee)
 - Working with the OEMS and US & Mexican Customs
 - Looking at best practices
 - » US-Canadian Border Process

 - Technology Driven solution, "paperless"
 - Collaboration with supply base
 - » Co-Loading-Density
 - Security
 - » Expansion of patrols on Highway
 - Unified Cargo Process (Columbia Bridge)
