§395.2 - "Electronic Logging Device (ELD) means a device or technology that automatically records a driver's driving time and facilitates the accurate recording of the driver's hours of service, and that meets the requirements of subpart B of this part."

Key requirements:

- Not necessarily a physical device but a technology platform
- Integrally connected to the CMV's engine to automatically track vehicle movement and operation
- Date, time and location automatically captured
- Satisfies display and data transfer requirements
- Resistant to tampering and ability to monitor compliance and detect malfunctions
- Allow for annotation by both driver and carrier to explain or correct records

ELD Compliance Requirements



- Must be registered with the FMCSA registry; and
- Must be certified by the provider that it meets all technical specifications.

Key Dates and Compliance Phases



Phase 1	February 16, 2016	"Effective date" ELD providers with compliant product can register on the FMCSA registry	Awareness and transition – Carriers and drivers can voluntarily adopt ELDs. Should research and evaluate ELD options, and prepare to transition to ELDs.	✓	✓	✓	✓
Phase 2	December 18, 2017	"Compliance date" ELD becomes mandatory for qualifying carriers and drivers	Phased-in compliance – Unless carriers and drivers are using AOBRs, must adopt ELDs.			~	✓
Phase 3	December 16, 2019	"Full compliance date" End of AOBR Grandfathering All carriers and drivers must abandon AOBRs and use ELDs	Full compliance – All carriers and drivers must adopt ELDs.				✓

Roadside implementation timeline





E.g. truck to be towed, ELD installed



Except for the following drivers:

- Drivers currently allowed to use timecards could continue to do so under § 395.1(e)
- Drivers that are intermittently required to record HOS duty status (because they go outside of the specified short haul criteria), but for no more than 8 days in any 30 day period
- Drivers who conduct driveaway-towaway operations, where the vehicle being driven is the commodity being delivered
- Drivers of vehicles manufactured before model year 2000.

Impact of ELDs on violations and inspections

- Expect reduction in form & manner and HOS violations from use of ELDs
- No ELD equivalent to no RODs
- Drivers not able to operate ELD and transfer or display can be treated as no RODS violation



Strategize your transition






- Understand the device you are choosing
- Weigh up the impacts on your operations
- Consider and clearly outline:
 - i. Timing
 - *ii.* Phases of implementation
 - *iii.* Who needs to be involved
 - *iv.* Who's doing what and why; pre, during and post on-boarding process

Update company policies and practices





- Requirements for training
- Define and outline criteria and restrictions for use of special driving categories
- Set out expectations for drivers around reviewing, editing and submitting logs
- Develop and define policy for login and logout for all staff
- Continue to review and update

- Drivers
- Mechanics
- Dispatcher
- Fleet managers
- Safety managers
- HR

Unidentified driving



What's the rationale?





- ELD must record all driving time and trips for the vehicle
- All driving trips must be assigned to drivers or be explained by the carrier
- Any time vehicle is driven without a driver logged in is considered to be unidentified driving time
- Enforcement to have visibility over any unidentified driving events captured on the ELD at roadside inspections

Training on all fronts





Drivers

• Login and logout with personal pin

Mechanics

- Use login provided or advise fleet manager/ dispatcher
- Selecting yard move if within the definition
- Check to make sure drivers have logged out

Fleet managers / Safety managers / Dispatcher

- Set up drivers, mechanics and support users
- Set out policies for login/logout and security with pin
- Responsible for managing unidentified driving trips


